ANNUAL AREAS

LANDSCAPING: NATURE'S AIR CONDITIONER

In addition to providing decorative beauty, living landscaping such as trees and shrubs can also be an environmental asset. One of the practical benefits of living landscaping is its ability to cool the areas around it.



First of all, trees and shrubs provide shade. The ancient Romans planted rows of tall, column-like cypress trees primarily for the cool shadows that they cast. To this day, walls and canopies of dense greenery still provide comforting shade to the properties where they reside. This is especially beneficial in urban areas full of concrete that holds onto heat that it gathers in the form of sunlight.

A more complex way that landscaping reduces temperature is through the natural process of transpiration. In transpiration, moisture is transferred from the tree's roots all the way up through the plant structure to the leaves. Tiny droplets of water are released through tiny pores in the leaves, where they evaporate and become water vapor. The heat that is needed to convert the water to vapor is removed from the surrounding atmosphere, cooling the air around the tree.

By providing shade and removing ambient heat via transpiration, trees and shrubs create refreshing comfort that allows you to enjoy your outdoor spaces all summer long.

GETTING A READ ON DIFFERENT WEEDS

Homeowners who care about their turf seek a lawn that is plush, green, and uniform. While this is a worthy goal to shoot for, it's a major challenge to realize. Even as the turfgrass that you've planted thrives, invasive weeds are always trying to make inroads. Weeds compete for the same resources (sunlight, water and nutrients) that your turf needs. A successful invasion can lead to these weeds eventually taking over large areas of turf. Not all weeds are the same, but they can be put into two major categories: grassy and broadleaf.

INVADERS IN DISGUISE

Grassy weeds are (you guessed it) very similar in shape and appearance to your established turfgrass.

Creeping bent grass, goosegrass, and crabgrass are types of grassy weeds that try their best to blend in with your turf. These grassy weeds can quickly take up residence, and they can be extremely hard to get rid of once they begin to spread. Since these invasive weeds are very similar to turf, weed removal must be very



selective to avoid harming the lawn itself. The best treatment for these types of weeds is a selective pre-emergent that stops weed seeds from germinating into viable plants. This stops the germination process while leaving established turf unharmed. The best time to apply these treatments is in the spring, when warm temperatures are setting the growth process in motion. Since these applications stop seed germination, it's important to avoid pre-emergent treatments on newly seeded turf areas.

BROADLEAF BLUES

Broadleaf weeds are the second category of weeds that your lawn will likely encounter. These weeds are leafy, not blade-like. While they vary greatly, broadleaf weeds such as dandelions, thistle, and clover stick out like a sore thumb. The good thing about broadleafs' distinctive features is that they're easy to locate and spot-treat after they've emerged. Some broadleaf weeds are annuals that come back year after year. For these, a lawn-wide preemergent in the fall will prevent them from popping up the following year.



Weeds come in all shapes and sizes. Knowing what you're dealing with and acting accordingly can set your lawn up for a long, healthy season free of weedy interlopers.



TAKING THE GUESSWORK OUT OF WATERING

Watering your lawn seems like an easy, straightforward task. The fact that your lawn needs water to survive is obvious. In practice, there are best practices of watering that are sometimes tricky to follow. For the best results, an installed irrigation system can help take the guesswork, and the physical work, out of the watering process.

For irrigation to be effective, the water must be absorbed into your turf's roots. This can be difficult, especially in the middle of a dry, hot summer, when topsoil is hard and resistant to water. A short blast with a high volume can lead to the water simply running off and never soaking in. For water to penetrate your lawn's surface, a long, steady soak is in order.

In addition to the duration of watering sessions, the timing is also important. Watering in the middle of the day, during the hottest hours, is inefficient because a lot of water can be lost to evaporation. When the sun is most intense, water droplets can

act like magnifying glasses that will scorch and damage your grass blades. The most efficient and effective time to water your lawn is early in the morning.

While these methods look good on paper, they can be difficult to put into practice. Keeping track of your watering schedule and adjusting according to recent weather can be a hassle. Not too many homeowners feel like dragging sprinklers and hoses through dewy grass first thing in the morning before work. Mowing your lawn may not seem related to weed prevention, but the right mowing habits can be very beneficial. Weeds need sunlight to germinate. Increased soil exposure raises the lawn's temperature, which impedes turf growth while facilitating weed development. A best practice is to set your mower blades to only remove one-third of the blade height with each mowing.

While herbicides are an important part of lawn care, fostering vital, healthy turf is the best defense against invasive weeds.

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
